Hello from the Chairman

- **Stop Press News from Valerie** - A US medical team is visiting CRP in December in support of the Speech and Language Therapy Department to carry out 50 operations for cleft palates; Jake Timothy, a neuro- surgeon from Leeds Teaching Hospital Trust who specializes in treatment of strokes and spinal injuries, visits CRP soon to treat spinal cases and run workshops for Bangladeshi surgeons; the Bangladesh Government has offered land for development of CRP's facility at Moulvibazar; a private donor has offered CRP a gift of land in Rajshahi ; the International Red Cross has just signed an MOU to assist CRP for six months with prosthetic and orthotic equipment; an Australian company may fund a new workshop at Gonakbari to make stretchers, wheelbarrows and bicycle trailers to help with safety at work.
- Congratulations to Philomena Commons, a VTT Trustee, on obtaining her Doctorate of Philosophy from Leeds University. The subject of her thesis was on Social Factors Influencing the Education of Physiotherapists Around Disability in Bangladesh

Report from the 2011 Annual Supporters Meeting

- The highlight of the meeting was a stimulating presentation by Neil Roberts and Grace Shepherd on their recent experiences as volunteers at CRP.
- Recent developments at CRP included the appointment of Major General (ret'd) Shafiqul Islam as Executive Director who joined CRP on 24th April, 2011; development of new facilities at Chittagong and Moulvibazar; planning for the Vocational Training Institute to move to Manikganj; work on the new Paediatric Unit at Savar which will increase the number of places from 21 to 30.
- Fundraising - £98,000 was sent to CRP in 2010-11; that income had been helped by Valerie's two visits to the UK.
- In 2011 there is no fundraising in the UK by Valerie. Also the value of Gift Aid to VTT reduces due to the reduction in the rate of tax relief. It will be a challenging year if we are to meet our £100,000 target.
- Catherine Hall resigned as a Trustee following the birth of her son, Dillon, and was thanked for her contribution to VTT since its formation.
- Bertie Woolnough, Fahmida Begum and David Newell were re-elected as Trustees. Bertie Woolnough was subsequently re-elected as Chairman and Wendy Best was again co-opted as a Trustee.

Remarkable Young Man Rolls Back Home – Peter Donnelly writes:

Rolling back home was a personal challenge I set myself that I was determined see through. And even though I didn't know all the particulars, I wanted to show people what could be achieved when you use a wheelchair. After volunteering with the peer counsellors at CRP for 4 months at the end of last year, I thought it would be a good idea to raise some money for the CRP as I made my way back home and I set a £5000 goal.

The more people I told about my trip the more people were interested. Friends I've not seen in years got in touch with me inviting me to stop by and say hello. All the invites changed my route considerably and built the 6 week journey into a 5 month, 14,000 mile marathon. I've always enjoyed travelling so it was no hardship and I really like to be challenged so any difficulties I came across were more than welcome.

As I travelled back through a mix of developed and developing countries I saw varying levels of acceptance and accessibility. These ranged from reluctance

of my abilities in Nepal, to tank-like stair climbers in Beijing's Forbidden City to (kind hearted but mistaken) people trying to give me money as I passed through the markets in Kazakhstan. Undoubtedly there were people who looked down on me but their views are formed out of ignorance which I believe one day will change. The reason I believe this is because, as I came back home, whenever I did need help I would always find someone willing to aid me quite easily.

A classic question that people ask about any travel is the food situation. The strangest food that I had while I was away would have to be the snake soup I tried in Taipei. I actually thought it was tasty but when I bit into the snake meat at the bottom of the bowl I got a mouth full of bones which I'm not a big fan of. The soup was accompanied by 3 alcohol shots made from the snake's gall bladder, venom and blood. My favourite was the blood!

The most difficult journeys were the longest ones.

My trip included a 48 hour ferry from Osaka to Shanghai which left me sea sick on the second day; this could be partly due to my time spent in the karaoke bar on the first night. I spent 24 hours on a bus crossing from China to Kazakhstan which was made easier by the fact we had beds on the bus. This journey ended in disappointment after I realised I left my hat on the bus and it was gone forever. That was my favourite hat! The longest train journey followed shortly after, when I spent a gruelling 71 hours crossing Kazakhstan to get to the Caspian Sea.

I have managed to raise a little over £5000 thanks to the generous people who have donated to VTT. The money has gone to opening a small centre in Moulvibazar where two physiotherapists are now treating those in need. Since getting back I've also given a presentation about my story at Southport Spinal Unit to people in similar situations to myself to let them know that anything is possible. This is something that I hope to do more of in the future.
