#### From our Treasurer, Stuart Jeffreys

Total income (net of expenses) in the first half year was £86,419. This is well ahead on last year, and includes £51,089 of corporate and international donations raised by CRP but channelled through VTT. Excluding these amounts, income is comparable with (although slightly lower than) last year. £60,000 will be sent to CRP shortly.

Annual accounts for 2015/16 have been finalised following the independent examination. Last year VTT changed its policy to allow funds to be used by CRP to assist patients in the mother and child unit, the inclusive school, and/or with Prosthetics & Orthotics as well as patients with spinal cord injuries. In order to allow CRP to spend funds where the needs are greatest, future donations should be regarded as unrestricted.

#### **VOLUNTEERS' EXPERIENCES AT CRP**

Charlotte Walker and Hannah Carruthers had gone out to CRP together last August for 7 weeks. Charlotte had studied Prosthetics and Orthotics at University and had just graduated before she went out. She described the challenge of helping patients who, having had limbs amputated some time ago had a lot of muscle wastage. She also found that amputations performed in Bangladesh had often not been made in a way that facilitated the fitting of prosthetic devices. But she had clearly enjoyed the work and made the most of the opportunity to interact with staff and patients despite the language barrier. Back in the UK she is hoping to go out to CRP again some time, and is accumulating for CRP a box of prosthetic devices, which cannot be reused in the UK according to NHS rules, and asked anyone going to CRP to take some of them.

Hannah was a trainee Rehabilitation Engineer in the NHS in the middle of a 3 year Graduate programme in Clinical Engineering and had chosen to go to CRP to satisfy the course's requirement for a month's experience of this work in another environment. She had divided her time between Savar and Gonokhbari, where the manufacture of wheelchairs is now located. She had been impressed by the enthusiasm of Firoz and his team at the workshop, and had welcomed the opportunity to be involved in the whole process from clinical assessment to specification of device (e.g. wheelchair) to manufacture of the device, since in the NHS she had no involvement in the manufacturing. At CRP she had been involved in assistive devices for children with cerebral palsy.

They both said they had enjoyed the food there, and put on weight, but the main point for them had been the friendships they made with staff and patients.

#### **HISTORY OF CRP**

#### **MORE OVERSEAS SUPPORT**

On 1<sup>st</sup> November, the Chairman and Administrator of VTT met with Mr. Murteza Khan, of the AKKhan organisation, which enabled the setting up of the Centre in Chittagong. The purpose of the meeting was to explore the processes necessary in establishing a FCRP network in Holland. Murteza, who is marrying a Dutch girl, has already met to discuss the plans with Hanneke Cusell, a long time CRP supporter in Holland. We wish them well.

## 2017 Annual Supporters Meeting – Brian Woodgate, Administrator, reports:

The Annual Meeting was, once again, very well attended by Trustees, members and supporters, who were treated to an excellent 'light' curry lunch beforehand that was provided by Mokhtar Hussain, Daphne Woolnough and other helpers.

The Chairman welcomed all present and, in particular, Valerie Taylor. He also thanked a Trustee, Helen Mortimer, who had moved to New York, Area Co-ordinators for their help, and St. Paul's Church Centre for their assistance. The Trustees had agreed to widen the scope of our grants to CRP to include, not just the poorest Spinal Cord Injury patients (as before), but also the mother and child unit, the inclusive school, and Prosthetics and Orthotics.

**Volunteers** - Charlotte Walker and Hannah Carruthers had gone out to CRP together last August for 7 weeks. A summary of their experiences is produced in the box opposite.

Valerie Taylor thanked everyone for attending, and said how precious our grants are to CRP. She spoke of a recent case of a young man who had multiple fractures after a tree fell on him. The community responded by going round the village to raise money to take him to Dhaka. However, someone in this position may also need a helping hand as regards treatment costs and this is where our grants to cover the costs of the poorest Spinal Cord Injury patients come in.

She was grateful for the fund-raising done by VTT volunteers, like the beautiful cards made by Carol Bennett, and the events in Glasgow organized by Bryan Whitty. She also said CRP greatly welcomed volunteers like Charlotte and Hannah. And she thanked us particularly for the support of our prayers, noting that like all organizations CRP sometimes goes through difficult patches.

She had recently spent time in Melbourne, and had been able to meet up with three members of staff at CRP studying for PhD's at Australian Universities, fully funded, and doing research which will benefit CRP. There are also plans afoot to start an Australian organization analogous to VTT.

She reminded us that the Diploma in Prosthetics and Orthotics has now started at CRP with the support of ICRC.

Referring to the plan to establish Service Centres in each Division, she

explained that land is now available for a Centre in Sylhet. Also work

is now under way on a Centre in Mymensingh, and progress is being made towards centres in Pabna and Rangpur. As well as providing treatment, these Divisional Centres will facilitate the follow-up of patients who have been discharged to their homes from CRP and also support the establishment of units in Divisional Government Hospitals to improve the care of patients with Spinal Cord Injuries. Recently in response to an enquiry from Stephanie in the Kadoorie Foundation in Hong Kong about services for people with Mental Health problems in Bangladesh, Valerie had explained that Occupational Therapists trained at CRP are potentially an important resource for Mental Health patients and as part of their training they are given 6 weeks of Practical Placement with the National Institute of Mental Health in Dhaka. However neither of the 2 posts that have been created for OT's in Pabna Psychiatric Hospital, are occupied by OT's and when Valerie visited both places with Stephanie, they found the conditions desperately sad. The Kadoorie Foundation is now considering whether it could support a day-clinic at CRP for mental health patients.

Valerie had been delighted by the offer of help by the Rotary Club of St Austell for the refurbishment of the Operating Theatre. Roger Varney explained the situation and outlined the plans for the future of the theatres. She also paid tribute to Primark for the way they have continued to support CRP in the years following Rana Plaza: they have now agreed fund three International Consultants for an extra 3 years for the School of Orthotics and Prosthetics

Another surprise has been a gift of £100,000 from a lady in Bangladesh to pay for an extra floor to be built on top of the new Rotary International building for Rehabilitation following a stroke. There was also an unexpected gift of £25,000 from a company in Bangladesh which will be used to pay for a retaining wall on the pond at Savar to prevent it from bringing down the nearby boundary wall.

#### Aziz's success

Aziz has been working in the Prosthetics and Orthotics department at CRP as a technician for the last 4 years. He lives in Savar with his newly wedded wife and mother. Recently he received a scholarship to attend an 18 months Diploma course in Orthopaedic Shoe Technology in Vietnam which will commence in September, 2017.

Twenty years ago, his life was completely different. He was a 10 years old boy living with his family in Natore, Rajshahi. One sunny day in 1997 he was going to the market by bicycle. Suddenly, his cycle collided with a truck coming from the opposite direction and the truck ran over his legs. He was immediately taken to the Rajshahi Medical College Hospital, where he was left untreated with only a few bandages to cover his wounds. His condition deteriorated as infection spread to his bones. He went to a missionary hospital in order to receive better treatment. There, the doctors suggested amputating both his legs to avoid the risk of cancer in future.

Two years after his accident, he received prosthetic legs from an NGO and which lasted for five years. He then had aluminum prosthetic legs made at the missionary hospital. Unfortunately, these only lasted for one and a half year. During this period, he passed his secondary and higher secondary school exams. At the same time, his father left the family and remarried, which made Aziz's life more miserable. He joined Action on Disability & Development (ADD) as a volunteer and was later appointed as a Field Officer. He worked with ADD for nine years at Natore. When looking for more sustainable options for artificial limbs, he found that one NGO, the Centre for Disability Development (CDD), provides different assistive devices for the disabled.

He was just about to buy his third pair of prosthetic legs from CDD when he received an invitation to a conference on Prosthetics and Orthotics at CRP. That was the day he came to know about CRP and its services. He joined CRP as a vocational trainee on the computer application course and ordered his artificial legs from the P&O department in 2013. Following the course, he was appointed as a P&O Technician at CRP. Aziz said that CRP produces the best and most sustainable artificial limbs at a reasonable price.

Three staff from CRP have previously attended this course in Vietnam. Aziz will be the first disabled (bilateral amputee) attendee. He will rejoin CRP after finishing the course.
